BATH AND NORTH EAST SOMERSET COUNCIL (PUBLIC FOOTPATHS BA27/27 & BA27/28, HYGGE PARK, KEYNSHAM) (NO.2) TEMPORARY TRAFFIC REGULATION ORDER 2025

Bath and North East Somerset Council ("the Council") being the highway authority for Public Footpaths BA27/27 & BA27/28 in the County and District of Bath and North East Somerset is satisfied that all traffic in the said public footpaths should be restricted because works are being or are proposed to be executed on or near the footpaths to facilitate residential development construction works on behalf of Crest Nicholson Operations Limited.

The Council in exercise of its powers under section 14 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and of all other enabling powers hereby makes the following order:

- No person shall proceed in that length of Public Footpath BA27/28 commencing from a junction with Bath Road at grid reference ST 6653 6822 (point A on the Order Plan) and proceeding in a generally southerly direction for approximately 199 metres to grid reference ST 6656 6804 (point B on the Order Plan); and that length of Public Footpath BA27/27 commencing from grid reference ST 6656 6796 (point C on the Order Plan) and proceeding in a generally eastsoutheasterly direction for approximately 259 metres to grid reference ST 6678 6783 (point D on the Order Plan).
- 2. Nothing in Article 1 of this order shall apply to any contractor necessarily proceeding to or from the said works.
- This order shall come into operation on 1 April 2025 and will be operative for a period of one month. The Order may be cited as the Bath and North East Somerset Council (Public Footpaths BA27/27 & BA27/28, Hygge Park, Keynsham) Temporary Traffic Regulation Order 2025.
